Artist Statement

Through the lens of photography and graphic design, a continual count of fading farms is being documented as not to lose the significance of the rural entrepreneur. The first cooler has been filled with 50 farms and other coolers are awaiting to be stocked. A stark glimpse into the price of progress as it relates to food insecurity.

Each milk carton and farm is unique and represents another structure, another food source, another way of life lost. For example, my family's small dairy: 70 Cows x 2- Milkings Daily = Daily Nutritional Servings for 100 People. 5 Dairies within 5 miles = 500 People served daily. Now ZERO.
